INTRODUCTION

Helmut Lehmann-Haupt in his The Book in America, 2d. ed., emphasizes the fact that reliable information on the history of books in America is uneven in quality, stressing certain periods and subjects, and omitting others. The Colonial period has been carefully studied and recorded. The history of the early twentieth century has been described more fully than the century as a whole. The nineteenth century, especially the first quarter of it, has been neglected.

The inadequate treatment of such an important aspect in the cultural growth of the nation has led to an active interest on the part of research students in the past few years. The American Imprints Inventory, the works of the Bibliographical Society of the University of Virginia, the research work of specialists, and the conscientious efforts of graduate students are making contributions toward a more complete bibliography of American imprints and toward a more intimate a knowledge of those items.

This thesis is a small part of a larger study that is in progress to compile a complete bibliography of the publications that have been issued by the Maryland presses, and to trace the development of printing in that state in relation to its social, political, and economic history. In order to furnish a complete record, it has been necessary to limit each study to a few years. Some studies have been completed and have served as a basis for this Checklist of Maryland Imprints from 1811-1814.

The titles which have been examined are those of books, pamphlets, broadsides, and broadsheets. The location of early American newspapers has been handled in a comprehensive bibliography by Mr. Clarence S. Brigham in his History and Bibliography of American Newspapers, 1690-1820. A list of Maryland newspapers for the years, 1811-1814 and their locations have

been copied from his book for this thesis.

The primary source material for this checklist has been the records collected by the American Imprints Inventory which represent libraries throughout the United States as well as the British Museum in England. These records are housed in the Library of Congress under the administration of the Union Catalog Division. Bibliographical information was copied from these cards, along with the symbols of the libraries where the items could be located. These cards were checked with the Union Catalog for additional information and symbols. In addition to this list, the catalogs of the Rare Book Division of the Library of Congress, the Maryland Historical Society, the Maryland Room of the Enoch Pratt Free Library, the Peabody Institute, the Armed Forces Medical Library and Georgetown University, have been checked for additional items.

An attempt has been made to examine one copy of each title in the checklist. This has been accomplished by examining the titles in the libraries visited; or by correspondence with librarians who have prepared detailed descriptions of their holdings.

The locations of copies are shown by the symbols developed at the Library of Congress for this purpose. An asterisk placed beside a symbol means that the item has been located in the library represented by the symbol. The phrase, "(not located)," beside a symbol means that this library has been contacted, but has failed to locate the title. In a few instances, where the item is not too rare and can be located in many libraries, the symbol locations have been limited to twenty libraries. A list of symbols shows that the imprints may be found in forty-two states, the District of Columbia, the British Museum, and many private collections. Names of private collectors have been mentioned only when there are no library symbols for the title.

The general arrangement of the checklist is chronological. Within each year the titles are arranged alphabetically by author, or where there is no author, by title. The A. L. A. Cataloging Rules for Author and Title Entries has been used for establishing entries, and the Rules for Descriptive Cataloging in the Library of Congress has been the source for the description of the items.

The checklist of Maryland Imprints from 1811-1814 constitutes the major portion of this thesis. However, Chapter I presents a brief history of the social, political, and economic history of Maryland during that period, when the War of 1812 dominated the thoughts of that state as well as the whole nation. The important Maryland printers and publishers are listed in Chapter II, and an attempt is made to show how the impact of the war years influenced the type of material that came from the presses. The locations of the printing centers are shown in a map, and an analysis is made of the number of titles that are found under each of fifteen subject headings. The symbol index is arranged alphabetically by state.

The successful completion of this thesis has depended upon the co-operation of librarians throughout the United States. The compiler has corresponded with them in practically all of the forty-two states mentioned, and their responses to requests for bibliographical information have been gratifying. In the libraries visited, they have been generous with their assistance. Members of the staff of the Union Catalog Division of the Library of Congress have given valuable assistance to this project. The members of the faculty of the Library Science Department of The Catholic University of America have been helpful and understanding at all times. Expressions of interest from Mr. Roger P. Bristol, reference librarian, Peabody Institute Library, who has just published a bibliography of Maryland Imprints from 1801-1810, Mr. Rollo Silver, outstanding author and contributor to the

research of this period, and others have been sources of encouragement. The compiler is indebted to these many librarians and teachers who have taken time out from busy schedules to furnish aid during the work on this checklist.

CHAPTER I

HISTORY OF MARYLAND, 1811-1814

The period of 1811-1814 was one of tumult and danger for the young republic of the United States. The war of 1812, that was fought with England, threatened to destroy the union that had not fully recovered from its Revolutionary War of Independence.

Maryland played a significant role in this critical period.¹ Residents of the state represented the nation in foreign courts, drafted declarations and resolutions and led troops in important land and naval engagements. Geographically, Maryland was in a strategic position. Its long shore lines with accessible harbors and navigable rivers made it a prey for the British fleet that invaded the Chesapeake and Delaware Bays. However, in these same harbors clippers were built that embarrassed the powerful British navy and won recognition the world over.

Also, because of its geographical location, Maryland was the center of many political upheavals at this time. The planters in the southern part of the state had firm beliefs in the principles of the Democratic party; the trading class of the northern sector had Federalistic convictions; the shipbuilders along the coast, with their following of sailors from many countries, were willing to go along with the party that was in favor of keeping the lines of commerce and trade open. Yet these different sections with divided interests joined together with a common purpose when their liberty was threatened. The achievement of this unity set up an example for the nation to follow, because the different states of the Union needed to forget their personal feelings and combine their efforts in order to win the war.

As early as 1806 President Jefferson sent William Pinkney, a statesman from Maryland, as a joint Minister to the Court of St. James. His mission

was to aid Minister James Monroe in an attempt to negotiate a treaty that would rectify the wrongs that American ships had suffered because of the various restricting acts that had been passed by both England and France.² Pinkney and Monroe bargained desperately to safeguard by treaty the American rights upon the seas, but the British ministry refused to yield to their appeals, and England continued its actions against our ships and seamen. These acts were an insult to American pride, and soon the states along the Eastern Shore were appealing to Congress and demanding action against such affrontory.

In the summer of 1807 an incident happened that caused the whole nation to cry out for war against England. The Chesapeake, an American frigate built in Baltimore waters, was cruising to Norfolk to pick up supplies before sailing for the Mediterranean.³ A few miles out from the harbor she was attacked by the British frigate, Leopard when she refused to heave to and remain submissive while she was searched for British deserters. The unarmed Chesapeake was forced to strike her colors, but only after three men were killed and eighteen wounded. The injured ship made its way to Norfolk, where its arrival was received with outbursts of rage which spread over the country. For one time both Democrats and Federalists agreed. Again, at Baltimore, at Annapolis, everywhere, "citizens pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor" toward vindicating this British assault.

President Jefferson, still eager to keep the United States out of war, turned to the Embargo Act. He would keep the American ships from the sea and avoid any irritating incident that would further arouse the war spirit. By this Act he also hoped to force England and France to yield in order to get our products.⁴ But instead, the Embargo caused still more damage at home, as it was destructive to business and agriculture. Now England made the loudest complaints, yet she was better off than the South,

whose agricultural products could not be exported. The Act was repealed in the closing years of Jefferson's administration and replaced with the non-intercourse law which left open our American ports to all nations except England and France.

In the midst of this turbulent state of affairs the presidential election was impending.⁵ Jefferson refused to let his name again be used as a nominee of his party, although his friends in the Maryland Legislature urged him to consider a third term. James Madison, a friend of Jefferson's and a fellow Democrat, was elected President.

Madison followed the Jeffersonian policies.⁶ He had been active in legislative halls, but he lacked the strong personality of Jefferson. He was faced with the crisis of saving his party or keeping peace. His party was clamoring for war, and the country was kept in an uproar by the seizures, captures and compressments at sea. On May 16, 1811 the American frigate, President, flagship of Commodore John Rodgers, came to blows with the British sloop, Little Belt and killed several of her seamen.⁷ News of the engagement was received with joy throughout the country except in Federalist New England. There was a feeling that the insult to the Chesapeake had been avenged.

The Weekly Register published by Hesekiah Miles in Baltimore was the organ for foreign as well as home news. At this time it reported that feeling was running high in England about the Little Belt and there was a rumor that a squadron of ships had been sent to the United States coast line with orders to commence hostilities unless the conduct of the President could be explained.

Under such apprehension the Twelfth Congress convened on November 4, 1811, a month ahead of the usual time of meeting. Henry Clay, a strong advocate for war, was elected Speaker of the House and by his fiery eloquence helped to turn the tide of opinion more and more toward war. Finally, on June 18, 1812 the United States formally declared war against England. The

draft of the Declaration was prepared by Attorney General William Pinkney
of Maryland.⁸

Divided interests in Maryland were felt in the political trends. An episode occurred in Baltimore that turned the residents against Governor Bowie and caused them to elect a Federalist Governor, Lovin Winder. On June 20, 1812, two days after war was declared, the Federal Republican, a Federalist newspaper, published by Alexander Hanson and Jacob Wagner, printed an article against the administration. The Democrats mobbed the editors and wrecked the printing office. Hanson and Wagner went to Georgetown, set up an office and continued to print their paper. In July they returned to Baltimore and began to distribute the paper, which was still printed in Georgetown. Again, the Democrats were aroused and, again, Hanson's establishment was attacked by a mob. Hanson and some of his followers were imprisoned, but the mob stormed the jail and some of the prisoners were maltreated.⁹ Governor Bowie failed to prosecute the leaders of the mob, and the Federalists accused him of "shielding criminals." This incident and the disagreement between the counties and the City of Baltimore - about the influence which the latter should wield in state affairs - helped to bring Maryland into the Federalist fold.

In 1812 Levin Winder, a Federalist, was elected Governor. The House of Delegates also became Federalist, but the Senate continued Democratic. Governor Winder was opposed to war, but he set about to make preparations for the defense of the state against the invasion of the enemy. Under the direction of the Committee of Vigilance and Safety the citizens of Baltimore began the construction of Fort McHenry so that the city would be protected in case of an attack.

War was hardly declared before American privateers were at sea and bringing home prizes daily.¹⁰ They would attack British privateers, and even

small naval ships, with success. Some of the captains displayed great boldness and enriched our naval history with their thrilling exploits. The Miles Register which was active in publishing the war news gave a day by day list of the American prizes won by these daring vessels. Just to show that it was as facile with the pen as the privateer was with the cutlass it had this quotation at the head of the list of prizes,

"The winds and seas are Britain's wide domain
And not a sail, but by our permission spreads."

Baltimore shipbuilders were very successful in developing the swift sailing clipper. Models for these little vessels were borrowed all along the Atlantic seaboard, and Baltimore ship carpenters were in great demand. These fearless clipper ships were a godsend to the small towns along the coast line that were being invaded by the marauding fleet of Sir George Cockburn.

Early in 1813 Cockburn's squadron was strengthened by a large British fleet under the command of General Robert Ross with orders to create a diversion from the Canadian coast. He was to take orders from Sir Alexander Cochrane, at Halifax, who was irked by the burning of York by the Americans. It is said that Cochrane wrote a note to Madison threatening the destruction of Washington unless reparation was made for this Canadian disaster, but the note was not received until after the burning of the capital.

President Madison was not indifferent to the dangers of an attack on Washington, but his Secretary of War, General Armstrong, held to the opinion that the British had no designs on the capital.
¹² As late as June he allowed the last regulars to leave Washington for Canada. Madison took matters in his own hands and began to requisition the neighboring states for militia. But as these states were also expecting an attack they did not respond too willingly. General William Winder, nephew of Governor Winder of Maryland,

was put in command of the paper army that had been solicited by Madison. His limited military command in Canada had not been too brilliant, but President Madison needed the assistance of Maryland troops, and he reasoned that the Governor might be expected to enter more heartily into the defense of the capital if his nephew were put in command of the troops.

General Winder failed to receive cooperation from Armstrong. By August he still had not received the necessary arms, ammunition and troops at Bladensburg where he expected to meet the enemy. Not until August 18, when the British fleet was sighted in the Patuxent river did the President order out all the militia and regulars around Washington and send fresh requests to nearby Governors for militia. The army that was finally raised to protect the capital consisted of infantry regulars, dragoons, militia from Maryland and volunteers from the District of Columbia. It was superior in number to the British, but there was lack of cooperation and unified command. It was in sorry contrast to the appearance of the English who were resplendent in their scarlet coats.¹³ The forces of Winder were discouraged and fearful. They were routed and retreated as far as Georgetown leaving Washington to be burned by the enemy.

But while Washington had been caught unprepared, Baltimore had been anticipating an attack for a year and had made preparations for it. Fortifications had been built at Fort McHenry which guarded the river harbor and the city by way of the South by ferry.¹⁴ It was a wellbuilt garrison under command of Colonel George Armstead. Two other fortifications, Fort Covington and City Battery, took care of the approach in the South by a fleet. To meet the attack from the East by land a fortified line of a mile long had been built. It was under the command of General Rodgers. All of these works had been constructed by townpeople. General Winder arrived from Washington with his troops, and protested because he was superseded in command by General

Samuel Smith, another wellknown figure in Maryland history.

On September 11, the British fleet was spotted as it entered the mouth of the Patapsco, under the command of Sir Alexandre Cochrane. The fleet anchored at North Point, two miles up the river, for the night, and observers from Baltimore watched it all night. Early the next morning the invaders advanced up the river, but decided to rest seven miles from the city. In the meantime General John Stricker had been ordered to advance and meet them. When the British stopped to rest Stricker sent American riflemen to break up the siesta.¹⁵ There was a skirmish that resulted in the death of General Robert Ross, the capable leader of the British, whose command was taken over by Colonel Arthur Brooke. In a combat in the afternoon the English advance caused some confusion in the green American troops, but again the British paused to study the position of the Americans. General Stricker took advantage of the lull and rearranged his men behind breastworks that had already been erected. He knew that the Americans were expert riflemen and could hold their lines if they were safely entrenched while shooting at the enemy.

In the meantime, the British fleet took its turn in the attack. Bombing vessels approached within two miles of Fort McHenry and began a bombardment. There was nothing the Americans could do except let the bombs fall as the British vessels were out of range of the American artillery. When the British grew bolder and advanced up into the harbor the Americans immediately took advantage of this move and began to retaliate. Thus the bombing continued on through the night and until dawn the next morning.¹⁶

Francis Scott Key, a young attorney from Georgetown, had come to Baltimore to ask for the release of a friend who had been taken captive by the British at Washington. Sir Alexandre Cochrane agreed to the release of the prisoner, but refused to let him and Key leave before the bombardment for

fear that they would convey important information to the Americans. So Key had no way of knowing the outcome of the battle except when he could see in the "rocket's red glare" the American flag flying over the fort. When the fog cleared the next morning and he saw by the "dawn's early light" that it was still flying he was so moved that he took an old envelope from his pocket and wrote the words of the Star Spangled Banner.¹⁷

On September 14 Admiral Cochrane decided that the American position was too strong to take by storm. Colonel Brooke had already decided the same thing about the land troops. The British never made another attempt to capture Baltimore or any other city along the eastern coast.

This unsuccessful effort to take Baltimore had a far-reaching influence in winning the war.¹⁸ Had the British been fortunate enough to capture Baltimore, the most prolific source of the American offensive would have been destroyed. The British fleet had been ordered to destroy Baltimore because the Baltimore privateers had inflicted so much damage upon the British commerce.¹⁹ Also, a London paper declared that "the truculent inhabitants of Baltimore must be tamed with the weapons which shook the wooden turrets of Copenhagen." Again, if Baltimore had fallen, Washington would scarcely have been able to be reoccupied by the Federal Government. In this event the New Englanders from the Hartford Convention would have had no place to carry their complaints. They might have seceded as they threatened to do. Thus, Maryland with its many sections and divided feelings, joined together when the liberty of their state and nation was menaced. They protected themselves along with the peoples of the entire United States. Their accomplishments did much toward causing the British to sign the Treaty of Ghent on December 24, 1814 and toward ending the war.

CHAPTER II

PRINTING IN MARYLAND 1811-1814

The beginning of the nineteenth century was marked by a national expansion. Explorers pushed toward the west coast, and along with the pioneers went the printing press, in order to furnish the news and the printed book. This westward expansion was to have a lasting effect on literature in the coming years — Bryant was to be fascinated by the melancholy woods and Cooper was to people the forests with Indians and mythical figures. At the same time new principles were evolved in type casting and setting, in papermaking and in press building.¹ Ventures were being made to change printing from the household to the factory stage. The psychological importance of the War of 1812 with Great Britain was out of all proportion to its historical significance. The struggle cut off the new world from the old, and the new country could now go forward without interference from abroad. The war paved the way for the imaginative literature of the later part of the century.

The history of the printed page in Maryland from 1811-1814 has had no satisfactory treatment. Histories of the state, old newspaper files, imprints in the Maryland Historical Society — all these records contain authentic and interesting bits of information for the scholars who can piece them together so that they will fit into the national development of the book in America. For this paper a few of the records have been examined with the purpose of throwing a little light on where and by whom the material of our period was printed, and on the subjects written about and their significance in a National Bibliography of Early American Imprints.

Printing was centered in Baltimore, Annapolis, Frederick Town, and Hagerstown. Its history in these towns dated back to Colonial times when printing equipment had to be supplied from abroad. Baltimore and Annapolis were

coastal towns. Hagerstown was in a strategic position because it was near the entrance to the Shenandoah valley and on the road that led to this area. It was settled by Germans who were interested in publishing material in their own language.² Frederick Town was a supply point in the early nineteenth century when a road was being built from Baltimore to meet the Cumberland Road.³ It was founded by Germans from Pennsylvania, and its growth was steady from before the Revolutionary War. Its early publications were also in German.

Baltimore had the greatest number of printers, and there was some specialization in the subject material handled by each establishment. Fielding Lucas published secular material as well as Catholic works.⁴ He made Baltimore a center for Catholic publishing. Sergeant Hall printed the inaugural essays from Maryland University, and Joseph Robinson's name appeared on much of the material on civic affairs.

Printing in Hagerstown was largely identified with the name of John Gruber, and as early as 1786 Matthias Bartig set up a press in Frederick Town; he was still the most important printer in the period of 1811-1818.

The products of the press showed that Maryland was hard-pressed by the War of 1812. The uncertainties of the period restrained the creative writing of authors.⁵ The thoughts and actions of the people were turned toward the defense and preservation of their homes and country. Much of the written material was indicative of war problems and anxieties.

Newspapers played a major role in furnishing the country with the news of the war as well as with local and national information. The omnipresence of the American newspaper was a continued wonder to visitors from abroad.⁶ Both political parties were well represented by Maryland newspapers. The papers were openly and bitterly partisan, and influenced the turn of politics between the contending Federalists and Republicans. Nearly every publisher was

compelled to take a side in personal electioneering. An example of their political importance was demonstrated in an incident that happened a few days after ⁸ was declared. A Federalist newspaper in Baltimore published an article against the administration of Madison. This article caused a mob scene which resulted in a change in administration in the next state election. So early as 1808, there were five dailies in Baltimore; the Federal Gazette and North American were strongly Federalist and Whig, Post and American were Democratic. Annapolis had the Maryland Gazette and Maryland Republican. In Hagerstown The Maryland Herald, and Hagerstown Advertiser and Die Westliche Correspondenz furnished the news in both English and German. Frederick County boasted several papers. Bartgis' Republican Gazette was probably the most widely read. Newspapers of this period changed their names often, as Frank Luther Mott indicates in his list of titles in A History of American Magazines, 1741-1850.

Niles' Weekly Register was the best example of American journalism. Its first issue was published in Baltimore in September, 1811, by Hezekiah Niles, and it continued until 1849. To this day it constitutes the best known and truest foundation extant of the history of our country for the period in which it extends. John Thomas Scharf in his The Chronicles of Baltimore: Being a Complete History of Baltimore Town and Baltimore City from the Earliest Period to the Present Time says "The Register had a character and circulation in every port of the civilized world."⁹ Frank Luther Mott refers to it as "a file, a repository of contemporary data which includes political, historical, geographical, scientific, statistical, economical and biographical documents, essays and facts together with notices of arts and manufactures and a record of events of the time."¹⁰ It was quoted as an authority in courts of justice and in legislative assemblies. So strong has been the demand for back numbers of the Register, in both private and public libraries, that the first thirty two

volumes have been reprinted.

During the War of 1812 people turned to religion. It was a time for prayer and worship. Maryland had been settled with the idea that it was to be a haven for religionists who had been persecuted elsewhere,¹¹ and many different denominations arose. This Checklist of Imprints 1811-1814 shows many sermons, books of hymns and psalms, catechisms and proceedings and journals for church conventions. Bibles were printed in both English and German. The amount of religious material put out by the press during this period indicates that the faiths of the founding fathers still existed.

Many pamphlets of a legal or commercial form were issued. Extra sessions of the General Assembly in Annapolis were called, and the Proceedings of these sessions furnish historical records of importance. Jonas Green printed many of these Proceedings, as well as the laws of the state. Hellmut Lehmann-Haupt says that Green "betrayed the quality of charm in arrangement and display of types."¹² The Committee of Safety and Vigilance issued broadsides and statements urging the residents of Baltimore to cooperate in the procedures for defense.

The speeches of Henry Clay, John Randolph, Thomas Jefferson and other statesmen have remained a part of the heritage of our American literature. Those documents are still considered outstanding examples of cogent thinking and clear exposition.

Almanacs and primers were relied on as a source of profit. Perhaps the name of John Gruber, with his Hagers-town Town and Country Almanack and Der neue Nord-Americanische Stadt und Landt-Calender, has appeared more times on Checklists of Early American Imprints than any other Maryland printer. The Almanack has been in continuous publication since 1797. During the years 1811-1814, it appeared in both English and German. The style and format of the annual has changed very little in over a century and a half. The description

of it on the 1811 imprint does not vary too much from the present day issue. Old style wood cuts are still used. Its "conjectures of the weather for each month" have been read and at times believed by farmers in many states. Handbooks and primers were used for general information.

Students of the Medical School of the University of Maryland were writing theses on research work in medicine. Army doctors also wrote about the diseases and deaths caused by the exposure and privations that were suffered in Canada. Some of these imprints are preserved in the History of Medicine Division of The Armed Forces Medical Library. They have their place in the history of medicine.

Often, when a nation is at war, the most famous names are those of statesmen and soldiers. The War of 1812 furnished such a roster in Maryland, but other names appeared that have since been known and acclaimed. Certainly, the writing of the Star Spangled Banner, by Francis Scott Key, added a bit of sentiment to the rather sombre character of many of the other writings. On the day after the eventful night when he had watched the bombardment of Fort McHenry and had written the song, he went to the printing establishment of Benjamin Edes to have it printed. Edes, like some of the other printers of Baltimore, had closed his shop in order to don the uniform of the army and help defend the City. The song was taken to the Baltimore American, a newspaper, and struck off in handbills. In a short time both the army and the navy adopted it, but Congress did not formally pronounce it the national anthem until November 4, 1931.¹³ The original manuscript and one of the handbills have recently been purchased by the Maryland Historical Society and will remain there on exhibit.¹⁴

Parson Weems was the first nationally-known Maryland author. His Life and Memorable Activities of George Washington swept the country and ran into many editions. The fifth edition was greatly expanded and contained the cherry-

tree incident. William Wirt, in addition to being an orator, lawyer, Attorney-General of the United States and one time Presidential candidate, became a popular literary figure with the publication of The British Spy. John Leeds Bowman, author of a two volume history, was the first of a long line of Maryland historians.

The Checklist of Maryland Imprints from 1811-1814 shows that the residents were interested in many subjects, and, in spite of the difficulties of the war years, managed to make some lasting contributions to the nation's literature.



Weekly. Established Jan. 17, 1745 by Jonas Green under title of The Maryland Gazette. Publication suspended at intervals until 1766 when publication proceeded regularly. After death of Jonas Green, published by different members of his family. In Jan. 1811 it was published by Jonas Green, son of Frederick and grandson of the founder. The title was changed to Maryland Gazette and Political Intelligencer. With the issue of Jan. 23, 1813 shortage of paper caused revision to earlier title and reduction in size. Continued by Jonas Green until after 1820.

[Annapolis] Maryland Republican, 1809-1820-

Weekly and semi-weekly. Established June 17, 1809 by John Butler, with the title of The Maryland Republican. Published weekly except during sessions of assembly when it was published semi-weekly. With issue of July, 1811 Butler disposed of paper to Jehu Chandler. Last regular issue was that of June 21, 1817.

[Baltimore] American, 1799-1820-

Daily. Established May 14, 1799 by Alex Martin under title of American and Daily Advertiser. With issue of Nov. 30, 1801 the title was altered to American and Baltimore Daily Advertiser. Other changes in titles until July 2, 1810 when the firm was enlarged to W. Peckin and G. Dobin and Murphy. The title was changed to American and Commercial Daily Advertiser. In Sept., 1814, when the British attacked Baltimore, it was published intermittently. Regular issue resumed on Sept. 20, 1814.

Baltimore Evening Post, 1805-1811

Daily. Established Mar. 25, 1805 by J. Cook and Co. under title of Baltimore Evening Post; Mercantile Daily Advertiser. With issue of June 10, 1805 the title was shortened to Baltimore Evening Post. With issue of Nov. 27, 1805 Noakish Miles became publisher. After it was transferred to Thomas Wilson who published it until June, 1811. The last issue was June 22, 1811, after which it was changed to a morning paper with the title altered to The Sun.

Baltimore, Federal Gazette, 1796-1820-

Daily. A continuation, but without change of numbering, of The Federal Intelligencer. The change of title occasioned with the issue of Jan. 1, 1796, was Federal Gazette and Baltimore Daily Advertiser. William Gwynn began publishing it with issue of Jan. 1, 1813 and continued until after 1820. A country paper, tri-weekly, was also issued, certainly from 1807 to after 1820.

Baltimore. Federal Republican, 1803-1812, 1816-1820-

Tri-weekly and daily. Established July 4, 1803 under title of Federal Republican and Commercial Gazette. Printed and published for the proprietors (Alexander C. Hanson and Jacob Wagner) by Joseph Robinson. With the issue of Oct. 5, 1809 it was united with the North American. The name of Federal Republican and Commercial Gazette was retained, but a new volume numbering was adapted and the name of the printer omitted. The Baltimore directories of 1810 and 1812 gave Jacob Wagner as editor of the Federal Republican. Because of the demolition of the office by a mob in June, 1812 it was removed to Georgetown, D.C. where it was published for nearly four years. The last issue at Georgetown was Apr. 3, 1816. It was united with the Baltimore Telegraph under the new title of Federal Republican and Baltimore Telegraph. It changed publications intermittently thereafter.

Baltimore. National Museum, 1813-1814

Weekly. The prospectus issue was entitled The Museum and Weekly Gazette dated Aug. 27, 1813. The initial issue was entitled National Museum and Weekly Gazette, dated Nov. 13, 1813. It was quarto size, 8 numbered pages to an issue and included domestic news, essays, marriage and death notices. With issue of Jan. 29, 1814 the title was changed to National Museum and Weekly Gazette of Discoveries, National Sciences and the Arts.

Baltimore Patriot, 1812-1820-

Daily. Established Dec. 28, 1812. With issue of Aug. 18, 1813 the size was enlarged and title changed to Baltimore Patriot and Evening Advertiser. Later, its title became Baltimore Patriot and Merchantile Advertiser. A tri-weekly country paper, without heading, was also published from 1812 to after 1820.

Baltimore Price-Current, 1803-1820-

Weekly. Established Feb. 14, 1803, by Joseph Escavaille and printed at Anti-Democrat office. It changed printers and the title was changed to Baltimore Weekly Price Current with issue of Jan. 3, 1805, and to Baltimore Price Current with issue of June 26, 1813. Quarto size.

[Baltimore] Sun, 1811-1813

Daily. Established by Thomas Wilson on June 24, 1811. It was the immediate successor of the Baltimore Evening Post the last issue of which was on June 22, 1811 and bore the inscription late Baltimore Evening Post in the heading. The last issue located of The Sun is that of Jan. 29, 1813. Tri-weekly country paper was also issued.

Baltimore Telegraph, 1814-1816

Daily. Established by Allen and Hill on May 17, 1814. The full title was Baltimore Telegraph and Merchantile Advertiser. On Apr. 4, 1816 it was united with the Federal Republican under the title of Federal Republican and Baltimore Telegraph.

Baltimore Whig, 1807-1814

Weekly and daily. Established under title of Whig, or Political Telescope on Sept. 24, 1807. With the issue of Dec. 7, 1807, the title was changed to The Whig. With the issue of Oct. 22, 1810 the title was changed to the title of the Baltimore Whig. The last issue located is that of May 6, 1814, at which time the Whig was absorbed by the American. A country paper was issued tri-weekly throughout most of this period.

Cumberland Gazette, 1814

Weekly. Established in January, 1814. The only copy left is that of July 21, 1814, vol. 1, no. 28, published by William Brown, with the title of Cumberland Gazette.

Easton. People's Monitor, 1809-1815.

Weekly. Established by Samuel B. Beach Mar. 4, 1809, with the title of The People's Monitor. The last issue located is that of Dec. 23, 1815, vol. 7, no. 363.

Easton, Republican Star, 1799-1820.

Weekly. Established in August 1799. The full title was Republican Star, or, Eastern Shore Political Jannary. Titles varied until Jan. 7, 1817 when it became Republican Star and General Advertiser. Its publication continued until after 1820.

Elizabethtown. Maryland Herald, 1797-1820

Weekly. Established Mar. 2, 1797 under title of The Maryland Herald and Elizabethtown Advertiser. Beginning with the issue of June 8, 1797 the imprint reads "Elizabethtown." Elizabethtown was the original name of Hagerstown, but gradually was displaced by the later and permanent name. With the issue of Feb. 22, 1804 the title became The Maryland Herald, and Hager's-Town Weekly Advertiser. Hagerstown replaced Elizabethtown in the imprint. It continued publication until after 1820.

Fredericktown. Bartgis's Republican Gazette, 1800-1820

Weekly. A continuation of Bartgis's Federal Gazette. The new title was assumed in 1800. There were several title changes. Matthias Bartgis continued as publisher until after 1820.

Fredericktown. General Staatsbotto, 1810-1813

Weekly. Established in March 1810 with the title of Der General Staatsbotto, und Jahre Republikaner. The only issue located is that of Dec. 27, 1811, vol. 2, no. 91.

Fredericktown Herald, 1802-1820-

Weekly. Established in June 1802 with the title Frederick-Town Herald. Continued until after 1820.

Fredericktown. Hornet, 1802-1814

Weekly. Established June 22, 1802, under title of The Hornet, published by Matthias Bartgis in a small quarto, with four pages to each issue. With the issue of June 21, 1803, the title was changed to Hornet and the size to folio, and the whole of the last page was printed in German. It was succeeded by The Independent American Volunteer in 1807. The Hornet was revived in 1809. It was discontinued with the issue of July 6, 1814, vol. 1, no. 52.

Fredericktown. Plain Dealer, 1813-1814

Weekly. Established in June, 1813. Between May 25, and Oct. 19, 1814, the title was changed to Plain Dealer & Political Intelligencer. The last issue located is that of Oct. 26, 1814, vol. 2, no. 20.

Fredericktown. Political Examiner, 1813-1820-

Weekly and semi-weekly. Established Aug. 9, 1813. With the issue of Feb. 16, 1814, the title was changed to Political Examiner & Public Advertiser. Continued publication until after 1820.

Hager-Town Gazette, 1809-1814

Weekly. Established May 16, 1809 under the title of Hager-Town Gazette. The last issue located is that of June 15, 1813, vol. 5, no. 214.

Hagerstown. Torch Light, 1814-1820-

Weekly. Established in November, 1814. The only issue located is that of June 15, 1819, vol. 5, no. 32., published by William D. Bell, with the title of The Torch Light & Public Advertiser.

Hagerstown. Die Westliche Correspondenz und Hagersteuner Wochenschrift.

Hagerstown, Johann Gruber, 1795, from 1813 on Gruber and Fay; weekly, first issue June 1795, latest known Dec. 30, 1825. Frequently quoted as Der Deutsche Washington Correspondent (see Seidensticker 141)

Uniontown. Engine of Liberty, 1813-1816

Weekly. Established Sept. 9, 1813. The last issue located is that of June 15, 1815, vol. 2, no. 39.
